Two years in Spanish school

We moved to Spain a couple of years ago. We live near Barcelona, in a seaside town with a population of about 60 thousand people. Our move took place in August, and the school year begins on September 12, so we had a month to arrange three children (3, 6 and 11 years) to school. We went to the local mayor's office, wrote a statement, indicating in it two desired municipal schools and one concertado (semi-private school, in which a month of training costs about 150 euros). Private schools are too expensive for our budget, so we did not consider them.

What is the difference between "concertado" and "public"? First of all, the fact that the administration of semi-private schools more autonomy in some matters, as well as the fact that these schools are small: one first class, one second, etc.

After a while, we got a call from the school, where they identified the children — it was just "concertado". I read that these schools have a religious bias, but in our two years I have not noticed anything like that.

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The record itself is in school takes place in April. For families with children of school age, a brochure describing the educational institutions is sent by mail. You can only apply to one school, but you can specify multiple schools by preference.

Before the start of the school year, you have a week to buy textbooks. They are quite expensive: for example, for a third-grader set of books costs about 200 euros, so many buy used books.

LANGUAGES

The school speaks three languages: Catalan, Spanish and English. But which of them is the main, it is not clear. We live in Catalonia, which wants to separate from Spain, so the main language here is Catalan: textbooks and documentation are written on it. But children communicate with each other most often in Spanish. At the same time, some subjects are taught in English once a week: one teacher speaks English, the second — translates into Catalan. I note that in the lower grades I think English teaching is very weak, but in high school students with a teacher things are better, and the emphasis is on conversation. In addition, at the end of the year wishing to go to study in England for a week at their own expense.

ASSESSMENTS

Spain has a ten-point rating system. In Junior classes write usually "molt be!" or "very good!", "genial" etc. Elementary school has homework, but not every day. But in high school (ESO) ask a lot, and more often all homework is related to writing an essay.

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
