

Key Information Document – FX Spread Bet

Purpose

This document provides you with key information about this investment product. It is not marketing material. The information is required by law to help you understand the nature, risks, costs, potential gains and losses of this product and to help you compare it with other products.

Product

Spread Betting is offered by **FxPro UK Limited**, (“FxPro”, “we” or “us”), which is authorised and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority.

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You are about to purchase a product that is not simple and may be difficult to understand.

What is this product?

Type

A Spread Bet is a form of contract for difference (“CFD”), which is a leveraged contract entered into with FxPro on a bilateral basis, settled in cash. It allows an investor to speculate on rising or falling prices on an underlying asset by setting a stake which will proportionally reward the investor if the price moves in the chosen direction. Conversely, it will proportionally cost the investor if the price moves against the chosen direction. The price of the CFD is derived from the price of the underlying asset, which in this case is the price of a given FX pair.

CFDs are leveraged products and leverage is customised and set by the client. At the end of the day any open positions are rolled over and charged a daily swap fee. Please note that margin trading requires extra caution, because whilst you can realise large profits if the price moves in your favour, you risk extensive losses if the price moves against you. Failure to deposit additional funds in order to meet the maintenance margin requirement as a result of a negative price movement may result in the CFD being auto-closed. This will occur when your remaining account equity falls below the maintenance margin requirement.

CFDs on FX do not have a pre-defined maturity date and are therefore open-ended. FxPro retains the ability to unilaterally terminate any CFD contract where it deems that the terms of the contract have been breached.

Objectives

The objective of a CFD is to allow an investor to gain leveraged exposure to the movement in the value of the underlying asset (whether up or down), without owning, in this case, the currency. The exposure is leveraged since the CFD only requires a small proportion of the notional value of the contract to be deposited upfront as initial margin. For example, if an investor buys 1 lot of CFD on EUR/USD (1 lot equals 100,000) with an initial margin amount of 0.2 % and an underlying EUR/USD price of 1.19770/1.19780, the initial investment will be 200 EUR or the equivalent in your account’s currency. The effect of leverage, in this case 500:1 (1 / 0.002). Based on the trade size above, for each 1-point change in the price of the underlying FX pair the value of the CFD changes by \$10. In the case of a Spread Bet, this would be equivalent to a stake size of £10. For instance, if the investor is long and the market increases in value, a £10 profit will be made for every 1-point increase in that market. However, a £10 loss will be incurred for each point the market decreases in value. Conversely, if an investor holds a short position, a profit is made in line with any decreases in that market, and a loss for any increases in the market.

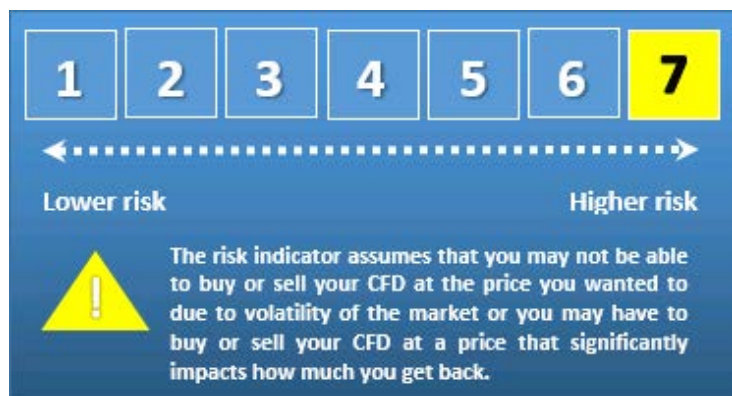
CFDs in general do not have a recommended holding period and it is down to the discretion of each individual investor to determine the most appropriate holding period based on their own individual trading strategy and objectives.

Intended Retail Investor

CFDs are intended for investors who have knowledge of, or are experienced with, leveraged products and who understand how the prices of CFDs are derived, the key concepts of margin and leverage, the fact that losses may exceed deposits and can afford to lose the entire amount invested.

What are the risks and what could I get in return?

The summary risk indicator is a guide to the level of risk of this product compared to other products. It shows how likely it is that the product will lose money because of movements in the markets or because we are not able to pay you.



We have classified this product as 7 out of 7, which is the highest risk class. This rates the potential losses from future performance of the product at a very high level.

CFDs are leveraged products that due to underlying market movements can generate losses rapidly. There is no capital protection against market risk, credit risk or liquidity risk.

Be aware of currency risk. It is possible to buy or sell CFDs on a commodity in a currency which is different to the base currency of your account. The final return you may get depends on the exchange rate between the two currencies. This risk is not considered in the indicator shown above.

Leveraged trading magnifies the losses of price movements and failure to deposit additional funds may result in the CFD being auto-closed.

This product does not include any protection from future market performance, so you could lose some or all of your investment. If we are not able to pay you what is owed, you could lose your entire investment. However, you may benefit from a consumer protection scheme (see the section "What happens if FxPro is unable to pay out?"). The indicator shown above does not consider this protection. You are also subject to risks related to internet failures, communications failures and delays or account password theft.

Taxation

Any profits generated by Spread Betting are exempt from Capital Gains Tax in the UK and Ireland.

Performance scenarios

The scenarios shown below illustrate how this product could perform. You can compare them with the scenarios of other products. The scenarios presented are an estimate of future performance based on evidence from the past on how the value of this investment varies, and are not an exact indicator. What you get will vary depending on how the market performs and how long you hold the CFD. The stress scenario shows what you might get back in extreme market circumstances, and it does not take into account the situation where we are not able to pay you.

The following assumptions have been used to create the scenarios in Table 1:

What are the costs?

This table shows the different types of cost categories and their meaning

One-off costs	<i>Spread</i>	All our platforms	The difference between the buy and sell price is called the spread.
	<i>Commission</i>	Applicable only on cTrader platform	This is a commission charged when you buy and sell a CFD on an FX pair based on the notional value of the trade.
	<i>Currency conversion</i>	All our platforms	The fee charged for converting realised profit/ loss from the instrument currency to the account currency.
Ongoing costs	<i>Financing costs</i>	All our platforms	The financing cost for every day you keep the position open. Depending on the position held (e.g. long or short) and our prevailing interest rates, your account may be credited or debited with the financing cost.

How long should I hold it and can I take money out early?

CFDs are intended for short term trading, in some cases intraday and are generally not suitable for long-term investments. There is no recommended holding period and no cancellation period. You can open and close a CFD on an FX pair at any time during the market trading hours of each CFD.
