1 A Widow in Debt

Imagine being a widow in ancient Israel. Your husband has died. You have two boys, with no way to provide for them.

One day, as you sit in your home, trying to figure out how to survive, a knock at the door startles you. You open it to find a creditor—angry, threatening. He tells you he has come to collect your debt. **But there’s a problem: You have no money.** No way to pay. And now, they want to take your sons—your only children—as slaves, until the debt is repaid.

How do you feel? **Helpless? Afraid? Desperate?**

This is the situation that a woman in the Bible finds herself in. She is the widow of a man who had once served the prophet Elisha. With nothing left but the clothes on her back and the love for her children in her heart, she does the only thing she can think of: she seeks out Elisha, the prophet of God.

“One day, the widow of a member of the group of prophets came to Elisha and cried out, ‘My husband who served you is dead... but now a creditor has come, threatening to take my two sons as slaves.’”

2 Kings 4:1



In this moment of despair, Elisha doesn't seem to offer sympathy. He doesn't promise to pay her debt, or to get her out of her hopeless situation. Instead, he asks her one simple question:

“What do you have in your house?”

The widow responds, “Nothing at all... except a flask of oil.” Elisha doesn't seem to be discouraged by its smallness. Instead, he instructs her:

“Go around and ask all your neighbors for empty jars. Don't ask for just a few. Then go inside and shut the door behind you and your sons. Pour oil into all the jars, and as each is filled, put it to one side.”

2 Kings 4:3

The **woman does as she is told**. She leaves Elisha, gathers the jars, though she doesn't know how this will help. And when she returns to her home, she shuts the door behind her and she begins to pour.

With every pour, the **oil keeps flowing**. It doesn't stop. Jar after jar fills up. She looks at the first jar, and then the second, then the third, her hands trembling in disbelief. The more she pours, the more the oil multiplies. Finally, when all the jars are full, she said to her son, “Bring me another one.”

But he replied, **“There is not a jar left.”** Then the oil stopped flowing.



Her miracle is complete. Her sons are saved. The debt is paid. The small amount of oil—what seemed like nothing at all—has become the key to her salvation.

“What do you have?”

Elisha’s question is striking.

Instead of focusing on our lack, God asks us to consider what we do have, however small it may seem.

Often, we approach life with a sense of scarcity:

- “I don’t have enough money.”
- “I don’t have the right skills.”
- “I don’t have time.”
- “I don’t have faith.”

The widow didn’t know how the oil would multiply. She didn’t even know if it would. But her obedience, even without understanding, opened the door to God’s miracle.

LESSONS FOR LIFE:

- ✓ Small steps can lead to big miracles. The widow’s first step wasn’t grand—it was simply the willingness to act.
- ✓ God can multiply what we have. It’s not about how much we have, but how much we’re willing to give. Bring what you have and trust Him to multiply it.
- ✓ Community matters. The widow had to ask her neighbors for help. Sometimes, the miracles we need come through the support and generosity of others.



Questions to reflect on:

1 **What is YOUR “jar of oil”?**
What’s something small you have—maybe even something you think is insignificant—that God could use in a powerful way?

2 **What do you feel you lack?**
Are there areas in your life where you’ve been focusing on what you lack, instead of the potential of what you already have?

3 **What is your step of faith?**
What’s one small step of trust or obedience you can take today, even if it feels uncertain or small?

Moses

A Life Marked by Miracles

The life of **Moses** —an important person in Judaism, Christianity, and Islam— is **marked by miracles**. As you explore this timeline, you'll see how in his journey the impossible became possible, bringing hope and new beginnings.

Moses' survival as a baby

Moses is saved from Pharaoh's decree to kill all Hebrew baby boys in Egypt (Exodus 2).



Burning Bush Encounter

Moses sees a bush that burns but does not turn to ash (Exodus 3). God calls him there to deliver the Israelites from slavery in Egypt.

Ten Plagues

God sends ten plagues (in Exodus 7-12) to Egypt, demonstrating His power and judgment over Pharaoh and the Egyptian gods.

2 Parting of the Red Sea

The Israelites had been living in Egypt for generations. For hundreds of years, **they worked as slaves under Pharaoh's rule**, their bodies aching, their spirits crushed.

Yet, through it all, **God had heard their cries**. He had seen their suffering. And He called Moses to lead them out of slavery into freedom, **promising to deliver them to a land of their own**.

“So the LORD said to Moses, ‘I have indeed seen the misery of my people in Egypt. I have heard them crying out because of their slave drivers, and I am concerned about their suffering.’”

Exodus 3:7

Finally, after a series of plagues that shook Egypt to its core, Pharaoh finally allowed the Israelites to leave. The Israelites, weary but hopeful, set out on their journey toward the desert.

But soon, **fear struck**. Because **Pharaoh changed his mind**. He couldn't bear to let his slave workforce go so easily, and so he gathered his army to chase after them in the desert.

While the sound of hooves and chariots grew louder, the Israelites reached the Red Sea—a vast, impenetrable body of water. They're stuck. **There is nowhere to go**. Nowhere to run.



Fear swept over the Israelites. Panic set in. They were trapped, with no way out. And in that moment of despair, they turned to Moses, their leader, and accused him:

“Was it because there were no graves in Egypt that you brought us to the desert to die? What have you done to us by bringing us out of Egypt?”

Exodus 14:11-12

Their voices were filled with disbelief. **They had trusted Moses, trusted God, but now they were on the edge of disaster.** Would they die here in the desert, caught between the sea and an army?

Sea split in two

But God had not brought them this far to let them fail. He told Moses to stretch out his staff over the sea (Exodus 14:16).

And Moses obeyed. He raised his staff, and at God’s command, the **waters of the Red Sea parted**. The sea split in two, creating a dry path with towering walls of water on either side.

The Israelites, amazed and trembling, stepped into the impossible. They walked through the middle of the sea on dry ground, surrounded by the overwhelming power of **God’s deliverance**.

As the Israelites reached the other side, the pursuing Egyptian army followed. At that very moment, God closed the waters over them, saving his people. The Israelites stood on the other side, looking at the water. The threat was gone. **They were free.**

LESSONS FOR LIFE:

- ✓ **Have faith in the impossible.** Sometimes, God asks us to step forward even when the way ahead seems impossible.
- ✓ **God can make a way when there seems to be no way.**
- ✓ **Obedience opens the door to miracles.** The Israelites had to act. They couldn't just stand there and hope. Miracles sometimes don't happen until we move forward.
- ✓ **God cares and acts to save.** The parting of the Red Sea shows that God sees our suffering, hears our cries, and will act to deliver us, even when we can't see a way forward.

Questions:

- 1 What is your “Red Sea”?**
Are there situations in your life where you feel trapped, overwhelmed, or surrounded by impossible obstacles?
- 2 For what do you need faith?**
Where do you need to trust that God will make a way, even when it seems impossible right now?

Bitter Water Turned Sweet

After crossing the Red Sea, the Israelites are thirsty. But the water is bitter and undrinkable. Moses throws a piece of wood into the water, making it good to drink. (Exodus 15:25)

Bread and meat from Heaven

The Israelites complain about hunger in the wilderness, and God sends manna, a bread-like substance, to fall from the sky each morning. (Exodus 16)

Water from the rock

When the Israelites complain about their thirst, Moses strikes a rock with his staff, and water miraculously flows from the rock. (Exodus 17)

Turning water into wine

God's provision is not just seen in the stories of Moses and the Israelites. Years and years later, Jesus Christ turns water into wine during a wedding.

3 Daniel in the Lion's Den

Imagine a man who spends his life serving others with integrity and wisdom, earning the trust of those around him. **Daniel** (620–538 B.C.) is one such man. He is a **respected advisor** to the king of Persia, known for his **wisdom**, his **faithfulness**, and his unwavering **integrity**. His work is impeccable, and the king values him deeply.

The other officials in the king's court are jealous of Daniel. They try to find something wrong with the way Daniel handles his duties, but they can't. **Daniel is trustworthy**. He does his job well, without any corruption or mistakes. **They realize they can never accuse Daniel of anything unless it's related to his faith**.

So they come up with a cunning plan. As they know Daniel's devotion to God, **they create a law that forbids anyone from praying to anyone other than the king**. The penalty? Being thrown into a den of lions. It is a trap—they know Daniel will be faithful to God, so it is just a matter of time before he breaks the law. Daniel, however, doesn't back down.

“Now when Daniel learned that the decree had been published, he went home to his upstairs room where the windows opened toward Jerusalem. Three times a day he got down on his knees and prayed, giving thanks to his God, just as he had done before.”

Daniel 6:10



Daniel's courage is striking. He decides to **stay true** to the one thing that always guided him—his relationship with God. He doesn't change who he is, **no matter what the consequences** might be.

The officials **catch Daniel praying** and remind the king of his law—anyone who prays to anyone but the king should be thrown into the lions' den. The king, upset, tries to find a way to save Daniel but he can't. He orders Daniel to be thrown into the den, wishing that **Daniel's God would save him**. The entrance is sealed with a stone, making sure Daniel's fate can't be changed.

Daniel spends the night surrounded by lions, a situation that seems absolutely hopeless. Yet **Daniel is unharmed**. The next morning, the king finds Daniel alive:

**“MY GOD SENT HIS ANGEL,
AND HE SHUT THE
MOUTHS OF THE LIONS.
THEY HAVE NOT HURT ME,
BECAUSE I WAS FOUND
INNOCENT IN HIS SIGHT.
NOR HAVE I EVER DONE
ANY WRONG BEFORE YOU,
YOUR MAJESTY.”**

Daniel 6:22

LESSONS FOR LIFE:

- ✓ **Faith often requires courage.** Miracles sometimes happen when we stand firm in what we know is right, even under pressure.
- ✓ **God's protection is real.** Even in the most impossible circumstances, hope is possible.
- ✓ **Integrity matters.** Daniel's commitment to living honestly and faithfully positioned him to experience a miracle.
- ✓ **Witness through obedience.** Daniel's steadfast faith not only saved him but also inspired the king and others to recognize God's power.



Questions to reflect on:

1 **What will you stand up for?**
What are the values, beliefs, or areas of your life that you feel are worth standing up for, no matter the cost?

2 **What lions are you facing?**
Are you facing any challenges, fears, or pressures that feel impossible to overcome?

3 **What is your step of faith?**
What step of courage can you take today, even if the outcome of uncertain or even dangerous?

My Miracle Journey

From age thirteen to twenty, I battled a **severe eating disorder** that nearly cost me my life—were it not for my parents and the power of prayer!

At 20, I experienced **sexual abuse**—later on severe emotional abuse. At 21, I **almost died** from negative effects caused by a blood cyst in my body. At 23, I narrowly escaped a kidnapping in Fiji, and then at 34, I ended up in a very **severe depression** in which I wanted to take my own life.

That's my resumé.

And that's how I know: **your past never has to dictate how your future will unfold!** Though these things happened to me, they did not define who I am and how God would use these events in my life for His glory. **God never gave up on me!**

Today I realize that each of these stages of my life, **no matter how painful**, only confirmed that **there's a miracle in every wound**. I experienced hope in each of these hopeless situations. In fact, I became stronger and happier than ever!



For over fifteen years now, I've had the opportunity to travel as a singer, author, and co-founder of a facility for women with eating disorders, sharing how Jesus changed my life!

And now I'm excited that I can share this hope with you through **A Miracle Every Day**. I pray that these messages will bring you the hope you need to walk through life with Jesus, one step at a time.

4 A Man Born Blind

Imagine **a man who has never seen the world**. Born blind, he has lived his entire life in darkness. Every day, he sits by the side of the road, waiting for the few coins that passersby might drop into his bowl. How must it feel to hear all these voices, all these footsteps, without barely being spoken to? To basically be ignored all day?

But then, **Jesus comes along**. And Jesus sees him. Not just as a person on the edge of society, but as a human being. He sees his need, his pain, and his potential. Jesus looks at him full of compassion and the promise of something more.

The disciples, noticing Jesus' attention, jump in with a question no hurting person ever wants to hear: **"Rabbi, who sinned—this man or his parents—that he was born blind?"** (John 9:3). Just like we do these days when seeing a person off track, we are trying to understand: "Why? What happened? What went wrong?"

But Jesus rejects the blame game. Instead, He points to something far more profound:

"Neither this man nor his parents sinned," said Jesus, 'but this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him.'"

John 9:3

Sometimes, the very things that we think define us—our struggles, our pain, our limitations—are the very places where something bigger can happen. **What seems like a curse or an unchangeable part of someone's life, can become the canvas for a miracle.**

And then, **Jesus does something unexpected.** Jesus could've healed this man with a word. A simple "Be healed!" and BOOM: vision.

Instead, "**He spit on the ground, made mud with the saliva, and spread the mud over the blind man's eyes.**" (John 9:6). It's messy. And very strange. It's not how anyone would expect a miracle to happen. Yet, Jesus asks the man to trust Him. And tells him to go and wash in the Pool of Siloam.

The man, despite the bizarre method, obeys. He could have questioned Jesus. He could have doubted. **He could have stayed where he was, with mud still on his eyes, waiting for healing to come without obeying Jesus.** But he listens. When he washes the mud from his eyes, his sight is restored. For the first time in his life, he can see the world in all its color and beauty.

LESSONS FOR LIFE:

- ✓ **See the potential, not the past.**
God looks beyond people's past and sees potential for miracles. What if we did the same?
- ✓ **Miracles happen in unexpected ways.**
Transformation can come through methods we don't understand.
- ✓ **God is not afraid to get messy with your healing.**
- ✓ What we see as **our biggest limitation**, can be the place where we find **our greatest transformation**.
- ✓ **Obedience is key.** The man had to act before he could experience change.

2 **Do you feel resistance?**

What is Jesus trying to do in you—even if it feels messy right now?

Not Everyone Will Celebrate Your Miracle

The moment the man born blind could see, he must have been overjoyed. You'd think people who know him would celebrate with him...

But instead, the people said:
“Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?”
“No,” others said, “he only looks like him!”
“It's not possible!”

People doubted.
People dismissed.
People discredited.

Why? Because miracles challenge our categories. They make us question what we thought we knew.

“How were your eyes opened?” they asked. The man's answer? “The man they call Jesus made mud...” (John 9:11)

That's it. **Jesus. Made. Mud.**

It wasn't flashy. It wasn't logical at all. Not theologically tidy. But it worked.

The rest of John 9 is almost comedic, if it wasn't so tragic. The man gets interrogated like a criminal. They even drag his parents in!

But the former blind man just keeps coming back to this (John 9:25):

“One thing I do know: I was blind but now I see.”

He didn't know all the answers. He didn't have a Bible degree, nor memorized scripture. But **he had his testimony**. He witnessed God's power and held onto it.



What to Do if They Don't Believe You

Just like the blind man who got healed in John 9, not everyone will believe you when you experience a miracle.

Some may dismiss your story.

When people question or doubt a miracle in your life, it can be challenging. Here are a few things you can do.



01 STAND FIRM IN YOUR TRUTH

Simply share your experience. Your story is valid and powerful, even if others don't fully understand it.

02 DON'T TAKE IT PERSONALLY

It's not about you; it is just hard for people to grasp something they haven't experienced themselves.

03 OFFER GRACE

Respond with humility and patience, offering space for questions without feeling the need to have all the answers.

04 KEEP LIVING THE CHANGE

Your life is the greatest testimony to what has happened. Let your actions and attitude speak louder than words.

05 PRAY FOR UNDERSTANDING

Ask God for strength to handle the doubts of others gracefully and for wisdom to respond with love, rather than frustration.



5 Feeding the Crowd

Jesus travels all throughout Israel, journeying from one village to the next, sharing God’s love in words and deeds. He **heals the sick** and the blind, **brings peace** to the troubled. In the midst of their situations, **people feel seen and heard**.

After one long day, the disciples are worn thin. Crowds had been pressing in from every direction—people hungry for hope, desperate for healing. **Seeing the exhaustion in His friends’ eyes**, Jesus gently gathers them close and says:

“Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.”

Mark 6:31

So they slip into a boat and push off from shore, letting the wind carry them toward solitude. The water glimmers under the sun, and for a moment it seems they finally find some stillness.

But **rest would have to wait**.

As the boat draws near the far shore, they see movement—dozens of figures, then hundreds, racing along the coastline. **Word had spread**. The people run towards them, **desperate to reach Jesus**. And there they were now, waiting.

Any other leader might have sighed with frustration or sent them away. But when Jesus steps onto the grass and sees the great crowd, **His heart moves with compassion**. The crowd is like sheep without a shepherd—wandering, wounded, hungry for more.



So **Jesus welcomes them**. And he begins teaching them many things. He speaks words of restoration and hope, while the sun creeps lower and the people hang on every syllable.

Eventually, the disciples approach, with concern across their faces. They are in the middle of nowhere, surrounded by thousands of people with rumbling stomachs. Evening soon will settle in.

“This is a remote place,’ they said, ‘and it’s already very late. Send the people away so that they can go to the surrounding countryside and villages and buy themselves something to eat.’” Mark 6:35-36

But Jesus turns to them with a surprising answer:

“You give them something to eat.” Mark 6:37

Their eyes widen—**five thousand men, plus women and children**, to feed. And when they checked their food supplies, they had **only five loaves and two fish** in their hands. Not nearly enough. Yet Jesus asks them to bring what they have?

So **they offered the little that seemed so insignificant**. Jesus takes it into His hands, lifts it toward heaven, blesses it and begins to break it. Piece after piece he places portions into their hands.

Then **the miracle unfolds**. The disciples carry food into the crowd. Every time they return to Jesus, there is more food waiting for them. The tiny meal becomes a feast. The disciples keep spreading, until everyone is full; laughter and sharing fills the air.

And when it was over, twelve baskets of leftovers remained—more **abundance at the end than there had been at the beginning**.

LESSONS FOR LIFE:

- ✓ **God can multiply what you have.** Even what seems small or insignificant in our hands can become powerful when we offer it to God.
- ✓ **Generosity matters.** Small acts of giving—whether it’s time, talent, or resources—can make a huge difference.
- ✓ **Trust and obedience are key.** The disciples had no idea how Jesus was going to feed the crowd, but they followed His instructions. Even when the task seemed impossible, their obedience opened the door to a miracle.
- ✓ **God provides abundantly.** God didn’t just provide enough food; there was more than enough—twelve baskets of leftovers. His provision is often more than we expect or imagine.

Questions:

- 1 What are your “loaves and fish”?**
What “loaves and fish” do you have in your life? Talents, time, or resources that feel too small to make a difference?
- 2 How can you bless others?**
How could God use what you already have to bless others?
- 3 Are you willing to share?**
Are you willing to share what you have and trust that it can be multiplied in ways beyond your imagination?

6 Walking on Water

Jesus had just fed more than five thousand people with only five loaves of bread and two fish. After such a miraculous act, He sent His disciples ahead in a boat while He went up a mountain to pray (Matthew 14:27).

The disciples are on the water, struggling against wind and waves, exhausted and anxious. Night falls, and **the storm grows** stronger. This is a moment of fear, uncertainty, and vulnerability.

In the middle of the storm, **Jesus walks on the water toward the disciples**. They are terrified, thinking they are seeing a ghost.

“But immediately Jesus spoke to them, saying, ‘Take courage! It is I. Don’t be afraid.’”

Matthew 14:27

Peter, ever bold and impulsive, responds:

“‘Lord, if it’s You,’ Peter replied, ‘tell me to come to You on the water.’”

Jesus invites him. **Peter steps out of the boat**, and for a moment, he does the impossible: he walks on water toward Jesus! Imagine his excitement and fear, the thrill of doing what no one else dared.



But soon, Peter notices the wind and the waves. Fear creeps in, and he begins to sink.

“But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, ‘Lord, save me!’”

Matthew 14:30

This moment captures a powerful truth: **miracles often happen in the tension between faith and fear.** You may be stepping forward boldly, but fear can make you lose sight of what is possible. Jesus reaches out and catches Peter:

“Immediately Jesus reached out His hand and caught him. ‘You of little faith,’ He said, ‘why did you doubt?’”

Matthew 14:30

Jesus is calm, steady, and completely in control of the situation. He does not scold Peter harshly; **Jesus simply invites him to trust.** The storm continues, but Peter is safe.

The disciples’ response

Once back in the boat, the storm dies down, and the disciples worship:

“And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. Then those who were in the boat worshiped Him, saying, ‘Truly You are the Son of God.’”

Matthew 14:32-33

They had witnessed a miracle, seen faith tested, and experienced rescue. Their perspective shifted from fear to gratitude.



LESSONS FOR LIFE:

- ✓ **Miracles require courage.** Peter stepped out of the boat despite fear. Miracles may call you to take bold steps, even if the outcome is uncertain.
- ✓ **Focus matters.** When Peter focused on Jesus, he walked on water; when he focused on the storm, he began to sink. Your attention shapes your experience.
- ✓ **Help is near.** Even when you begin to falter, rescue is available. You are not alone in your struggles.
- ✓ **Faith and doubt coexist:** It's natural to feel fear even while stepping forward in faith. The key is to keep looking to the One who can save.

Questions:
