FOREWORD



Entering 2022, the International Visegrad Fund team was engaged in intensive discussions about changes in and improvements of our programs and at the same time looking forward to the first peaceful post-COVID year when we could reestablish direct contacts with our grantees, scholars, and artists.

February 24, 2022, crushed these optimistic expectations. The new Russian aggression against Ukraine impacted the functioning of the Fund like nothing else in its 22-year history. Our first response to the crisis was an extraordinary call for proposals to provide assistance to refugees seeking help in the V4 region. We processed more than 200 proposals and supported 72 grants amounting to nearly €1 million. It was a very quick reaction for which I am deeply grateful both to the team for their devotion and creativity, and to the four foreign ministries who granted us a great deal of autonomy and support.


The Russian war in Ukraine obviously framed our activities throughout the year. Many grant projects involving Ukraine had to be adjusted or prolonged, the deadline for scholarships postponed and Ukrainian applicants for scholarships were prioritized. Also, the number of submitted proposals dealing with the impact of the war changed the general character of our activities.

Nevertheless, the Fund still had to deal with its standard activities—with regular grants and mobility programs directed to entities both inside and outside of the Visegrad region. In this difficult situation, the Fund's team not only managed to successfully deal with all the regular tasks but also succeeded in developing, testing, and launching two new mobility tools—the V4 Gen Mini-Grants for youth exchanges, and Visegrad Fellowships for short research and lecture stays. It took a lot of effort and personal involvement from all members of the Fund's team with a special role by the Deputy Executive Director Marianna Neupauerová. Her term in office ended in January 2023; without her coordination and inspiration, the Fund's struggle with the challenges of 2022 would have been much more difficult.

Note: For clarity, the following abbreviations are used throughout the text: "the fund" refers to the *International* Visegrad Fund; "MFAs" refers to Ministries of Foreign Affairs; "NVCs" refers to the national V4 coordinators; "QMS" refers to the quality management system; "EaP" refers to the Eastern Partnership and "WB6" refers to the Western Balkans (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo*, Montenegro, North Macedonia, and Serbia). The designation "Kosovo" is without prejudice to positions on status and is in line with UNSCR 1244/1999 and the ICJ Opinion on the Kosovo declaration of independence. "XK" (hereinafter indexed with a dagger†) is a temporary ISO-2 country code used by several international organizations, the European Commission and/or Deutsche Bank. All country codes follow the ISO 3166-1 alpha-2 standard.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

2022 cannot avoid being framed by the Russian aggression against Ukraine. The events that have taken place since February 24 impacted the International Visegrad Fund functioning like nothing else to date. Ukrainian scholars had to postpone their formal duties, grants had to be changed or prolonged, and the number of unsolicited aid-seeking inquiries coming from various Ukrainian institutions has been at record-highs. At the same time, the Fund witnessed an increase in the number of submitted proposals dealing with the war's impact and the general security situation in the region.

In quick response to the war and the resulting influx of refugees escaping from Ukraine, the secretariat put out an extraordinary call for proposals to assist refugees stationed in the V4 region as well as internally displaced persons in the territory of Ukraine. Processing altogether 200 proposals, 72 grants were awarded, amounting to a total value of nearly €1 million. Additionally, three more humanitarian relief grant projects—two in Ukraine and one in Moldova—were approved in December 2022 with total value €387,000. Contracts governing these projects and their implementation will have taken place in 2023.

The secretariat continued in its regular activities and developed, tested, and launched a new youth-exchange tool—V4 Gen Mini-Grants. The first two deadlines in 2022 attracted many applicants which consequently led to 68 grants amounting to a total value of nearly €860,000. As of 2023, the program is set up in a regular system of 3 annual deadlines.

A new artist residency program with the focus on fashion design was also negotiated and finalized in cooperation with the Milan-based Accademia Costume & Moda. Its pilot edition is planned with the first deadline scheduled for March 2023.

As regards the regular grant projects, the "business as usual" was marked by an increase in applications related to the war and to improving conditions for Ukrainian refugees both in the V4 region and in Ukraine. Other than that, no significant changes were introduced apart from better streamlining youth exchanges projects that get financed from a separate "youth budget" which also covers the budget of the V4 Gen Mini Grants.

As regards mobility projects, the secretariat postponed the deadline for Ukrainian scholars applying for Visegrad Scholarships by one month to April 15; as a direct consequence, a record number of 75 Ukrainian scholars were approved for a total amount of €383,500. The belated deadline has been officially approved as the new annual deadline for the scholarships.

Finally, a new short-term academic mobility scheme titled simply Visegrad Fellowships was developed in the second half of 2022 which will facilitate 2- to 10-week research or lecture stays within the V4 region.

As regards the functioning of the Fund's secretariat, several instances of turnover within the staff took place in 2022 and preparations started for the change of the Deputy Executive Director to take place in January 2023.

In total, regular projects amounting to €9,016,126 were approved in 2022.

I am proud of us providing Covid-related support to Eastern Partnership countries (2020/2021), setting up a new edition of the RDI programme with Japan (2021), successfully managing the extraordinary program for Ukrainian refugees (2022), upgrading the fellowship programme with the Open Society Archives in Budapest (2021) and Historical Archives of the European Union in Florence (2022), setting up a V4 gen mobility scheme, consolidating our residency programmes (2021) and starting a new fashion residency program in Milan (2022). Many encounters with our partners and grantees will be dearly remembered in my heart.

With regards to the applicants' geographical distribution (based on their official seat), the distribution has also followed the long-term trends of a relatively even distribution between the V4 countries oscillating between 17% and 26%, with the non-V4 applicants covering about 15% of the total approved sum.

As far as non-V4 countries are concerned, the EaP and WB6 regions were traditionally the biggest beneficiaries by grantee seat with the Western Balkans' 10 and Eastern Partnership's 8 regular grant projects.

I. GRANTS

With €5.6 million approved for regular grants, the average granted sum per project rose by 10% to almost €26,000 (specifically €27,718 compared to the average of €26,013 in 2021). Another trend continued where the average size of a grant grew while, at the same time, the average sizes became similar across the vehicles (i.e., grants were similar in size regardless of whether they were Visegrad or Visegrad+Grants, or Strategic Grants). On average, a Visegrad Grant amounted to €25,449 compared to €24,282 in 2021, an average Visegrad+ Grant amounted to €30,766 compared to €29,556 in 2021, and a Strategic Grant amounted to €43,744 compared to €35,075 in 2021.

As regards the thematic focus of the supported projects (focus areas/objectives), culture and common identity remained the most frequent thematic category with almost a third of all supported projects, but education and capacity building continued "catching up" and the overall distribution thus appears more balanced than ever before—also in terms of an increased ratio of projects dealing with innovation, R&D, and entrepreneurship:

2. V4 Gen Mini-Grants

Deadlines: August 1, November 15 (as of 2023 regularly March 15, July 15, November 15)

With a pilot deadline scheduled for August, V4 Gen Mini-Grants, a new program facilitating youth mobility in the V4 region started and continued its regular operation on November 15. 118 and 121 proposals were officially registered out of which 68 projects were approved in 2022.

The program introduced the first instance of two-step applications in which draft proposals get screened before the entire form is open. This drafting period ends approximately two weeks before the eventual deadline. Despite a more demanding administration during the registration period, the process significantly shortened the individual evaluation periods and allows for speedier approval of the selected projects.

The first rounds of monitoring visits also took place in the second half of the year and feedback was collected throughout the period to ensure continual improvement of the processes.

Given the balanced character of each project where an equal number of participants from each country are expected, a decision was made to attribute the budgetary allocations (see Assigned budgets below) in a shared way, so that the eventual per-country budgets better reflect the involved people rather than the formal recipients (see Country-led Projects below) of the budgets (as it is in the other regular grant programs):

3. Visegrad 4 Ukraine (Extraordinary Call for Proposals)

Deadlines: rolling basis (April 2022)

Based on the decisions of the Council of Ambassadors and the Conference of Ministers (March and April 2022), an extraordinary new program was established to assist Ukrainian refugees in the V4 region as well as internally displaced persons in the territory of Ukraine as a direct consequence of the Russian aggression. Altogether €1 million was mobilized from the Fund's EaP chapter and grant program reserves to be made available to municipalities, CSOs and other public or private bodies supporting immediate humanitarian needs (personal hygiene products, food, energy supplies, etc.) and long-term integration of refugees incl. assistance with administrative (welfare, employment) issues as well as issues connected to children's schooling and free-time activities.

Altogether 199 proposals from all over the V4 region and Ukraine were submitted, out of which 72 grants were approved worth in total almost €1 million:

As a citizen of Ukraine and part of the Visegrad Fund team, I am proud that our organization did not stand aside during such difficult times for my homeland. The Fund launched a special program "V4Ukraine" to help Ukrainians who suffered from the largest war in Europe in the last 77 years, and were forced to leave their homes and build a new life in the countries that provided them shelter. V4 organizations implemented all kinds of projects—language courses for adults and children, animal and art therapy. summer camps for kids, special aid for people with disabilities, cultural and sport programs, food services and so on. II. SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS

1. Visegrad Scholarship Program

The Visegrad Scholarship Program attracted yet another record high number of proposals from the 16 eligible countries—1,101 (out of which 35 were found to be non-eligible). Scholars from Azerbaijan and Ukraine remained the biggest applicants with 759 and 138 registered applications respectively, and Poland became the third biggest altogether with 44 applications.

Comparing this to the actual approved scholars, the biggest number were the holders of Ukrainian, Polish and Slovak passports respectively receiving support covering 151, 50 and 25 semesters. Altogether 152 scholars were approved for 308 semesters in total amounting to €1,232,000. Given the experience from past editions when about 10% of scholars canceled before contracting, the overall official approved budget exceeded that of the program for the year. The actual implementation then will fit within the budgetary allocations.

Traditionally, the biggest interest was again registered in Polish higher-education institutions when applying; the eventual approval of the 308 semesters awarded most to Czechia, Poland and Slovakia (with 100, 95 and 81 semesters respectively).

The three main long-term trends continued in 2022—the overwhelming interest from Azerbaijan, the relatively low interest among Czech scholars (less than a third of the turnout of the other V4 countries), as well as a general low interest in Hungarian higher-education institutions.

As regards the field of study, the highest interest within the approved scholarships was in *economics*, *political science* and *business* representing more than half of all approved scholarships:

Did the Covid-19 pandemic stop directly influencing the organization of project events during 2022? Exactly the opposite! New online methods forced by the pandemic helped to connect more people in hybrid working models. However, its impact is still an actual and important topic that the projects in Innovation, R&D, Entrepreneurship focus area were dealing with. For example. the project GVCs in Central Europe—A Perspective of the Automotive Sector after COVID-19 has achieved great success exceeding their original plan of activities and attracting also international interest thanks to a hybrid model. At the same time, the Visegrad Fund helped to develop scientific research in our region during the whole of 2022 in many areas beside Covid 19. Big kudos to all for their effort and work on innovative improvements!

2. Visegrad-Taiwan Scholarship Program

The recently reopened cooperation with the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO) in Prague continued with a second deadline on September 30, 2022. Of the 20 registered applications,

6 scholars were selected and eventually contracted. Given that quarantines were no longer in place, scholars could commence their trips at the very beginning of 2023.

3. Research Grants at the Historical Archives of the EU (HAEU)

The outsourced research fellowship program operated in cooperation with the European Union Institute (EUI) in Florence concluded its initial 2-year pilot in 2022. Altogether 10 researchers were supported during the three deadlines in April and October 2021 and May 2022.

Due to the Russian aggression in Ukraine, the third deadline of the

pilot—originally planned for April 2022—got postponed until May 31, 2022.

Based on a positive evaluation of the 2-year pilot, the Fund's director signed a contract with the representatives of the EUI in October 2023, thus outlining the basic parameters for regular cooperation with annual support amounting to €37.500.

This project raises library capacity to facilitate local social processes and promote Library-School Synergy as community mobilizers that support rural revitalization. It facilitates cohesion of three actors: libraries, public schools and local stakeholders to revitalize deactivated community participation in 6 municipalities of Georgia by sharing V4 experiences. Community libraries serve as spaces and vehicles for participation, cooperation and innovation among local actors.



III. ARTIST RESIDENCIES

Regarding the prestigious residencies in New York, two deadlines occurred in 2022—on March 1 (budgeted and taking place in 2022) and at the regular joint deadline on October 15 (taking place and budgeted in 2023). Cooperation regarding the literary residencies continued in the tenth edition with Villa Decius in Cracow and the applications were again collected and processed "in house" by the Fund just as in 2021.

Of the total number of 90 applicants, altogether 32 authors were selected to conduct the 6-week compact spring residency and the 3-month autumn edition (16 in each).

The project focuses on sharing experiences, transferring knowledge, and recommending further regional economic integration through development of the WB6 Common Regional Market using experiences from ex-CEFTA and V4 after integration into the EU single market. Project products (e-book and storytelling video) and events (conference, roundtable, webinar, lectures) address the difference in economic cooperation before and after entering the EU and how to speed up the process of European integration, with a focus on closer economic cooperation between the V4 and WB6 in the post-COVID period.

Of the ten projects we supported in the Democracy focus area in 2022, six are taking place in the Eastern Partnership and the Western Balkans countries. It clearly shows the Fund's continuous commitment to help with the democratization process of our neighboring regions and to build resilience against disinformation or hybrid threats. 2. Think Visegrad Think-Tank Network + the Mid-Term Conference

The Think Visegrad think-tank platform concluded its eleventh year of operations in March 2023. The following six **short-term analyses** were produced as part of the assignments:

- V4+DE—What to expect from Germany and its new administration?
- The question of Taiwan and the impact on world politics: positions of the V4 countries, the case of Lithuania and prospects
- French EU Presidency priorities (especially vis-á-vis V4 policy priorities)
- The implications of Baltic states' withdrawal from the 17+1 Initiative for the future of this format
- Results of the Italian parliamentary elections and their impact on the EU cooperation and policies
- U.S. Midterm Elections

Furthermore, four **long-term analyses** were produced dealing with the key current affairs that directly impact the V4 region:

- · France—trends and future endeavours
- Impact of the Russia–Ukraine war on European security and international order: a scenario analysis
- V4 defense cooperation
- Western Balkans—spiral of regress or new impetus for a revitalization of the enlargement process?

Additionally, a new type of a long-term analysis titled Western Balkans Scoreboard was developed for long-term monitoring of the progress/regress of the Western Balkan countries and was presented at the Analytical Days of Sveroslav Bombík held at the Slovak Republic's Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs in September 2022.

In total, nine **visiting fellows** from non-V4 countries received support for short-term research stays in the respective think tanks with one being belatedly supported from the 2021 edition.

The eighth annual Mid-Term Review Conference was organized by the Institute of Foreign Affairs and Trade of Hungary and the Center for Euro-Atlantic Integration on February 23–24, 2022, in Budapest. The program focused on the possibilities for cooperation between V4 and the UK, the V4 agenda on climate change and European strategic autonomy. The entire budget of the grant amounting to €12,000 was utilized according to the plan.

3. Think Visegrad in Brussels

EUROPEUM's Brussels office continued to enjoy the full support of the Think Visegrad platform and served as its Brussels hub during 2022. Altogether the following four private roundtables were organized:

- Work in Progress: Reforming EU's Migration and Asylum policy vis-à-vis French and Czech presidencies to the Council of the EU (in cooperation with the Egmont Institute)
- Keeping the Enlargement policy in ch(z)eck: How to steer the Western Balkans towards the EU in times of Geopolitical Earthquakes? (in cooperation with the SWP Brussels Office)
- From Prague to Chișinău: What is the future for the European Political Community?
- · Rethinking European Energy Security

For scheduling problems, only a single public debate event was organized in Brussels in cooperation with the European Digital Finance Association in November 2022:

• Al Act: Regulating the Regulated?

The remaining two events—one on Disinformation in Central Europe and the other on Cybersecurity and Hybrid Threats are to be scheduled for March 2023 and a suitable date in Q2 2023.

The bi-monthly continued to be disseminated to 2,500 key contacts and was further boosted by a newly created Facebook page for the platform.

Finally, the platform managed to catch up with a delayed implementation of hosting fellowships caused by travel restrictions in 2021 and hosted 10 fellows throughout the year:

5. V4 Energy Think Tank Platform

The fifth edition of the project faced the same challenges as every other similar initiative and had to move most of its events on-line. Also, due to the restrictions, its implementation had to be postponed until April 30, 2022, and was therefore concluded only later in the year. As a result, the 2022 edition never materialized.

The European Commission presented individual proposals within the Renovation Wave to help renovate buildings. The project offers public debates at the V4 level with the aim to motivate governments to consider public positions and to deliver the position of relevant stakeholders. The initiative supports adopting quality public policies to fulfil the climate objectives.

Projects from the Public Policy and Institutional Partnership focus area address a broad spectrum of issues in the V4, Eastern Partnership and Western Balkan countries by promoting policy change and good governance. They aim to connect expert communities and relevant stakeholders with decision-makers. In 2022 we were supporting both new initiatives as well initiatives building on the previously implemented projects. The project Empowering Serbian CSOs involved in the decarbonization process through the V4 experience was one of the new initiatives that was supported in the February call of 2022. Later that year, a follow-up project focusing on further support of reforms in Armenia with V4 know-how in i.a. municipal governance, healthcare and digitalization was approved. This time, one of the projects was implemented with financial contribution from the Foreign Ministry of the Republic of Korea. It is great to observe the ways connections can be strengthened and how knowledge is shared among the V4 experts as well as how the best practices from our countries can be transferred to the partners in the EaP and WB regions.

6. V4 Startup Force

Design Terminál, Kft. continued with the V4 Startup Force in cooperation with DEX (CZ) and Campus (SK) while changing the Polish partner to Startup Hub Poland. The budgeted sum of €148,252.00 was fully utilized through the usual outputs—a hybrid lecturing program, an on-line bootcamp and one-on-one mentoring sessions and pitching for a for an international jury.

7. Visegrad Bicycle Races

The tenth edition of bicycle races organized under the single banner of the Visegrad Bicycle Race took place in 2022. Based on the decision of the NVCs (formally approved by the Conference of Ministers while passing the 2023 budget), this edition was the last one with €80,000 budget and the trend of gradual lowering the support will start with the future 2024 edition amounting to €60,000. Eventually, the grantees will be recommended to (jointly) apply for funding within the regular deadlines of Visegrad Grants. Below is the overview of the respective granted sums and implementation dates:

8. V4 innovators in Israel Training Program

After the repeated delays and deadline postponements, the second part of the pilot edition of the *V4 Innovators in Israel training program* finally materialized under the title "The Entrepreneurial Ecosystem in Israel: Transforming an Idea to a Business" and took place from September 4–15, 2022, in Haifa, Israel.

In the end, altogether 28 representatives of startups and incubators were selected for the program—8 from each of Czechia, Hungary, and Poland, and 4 from Slovakia. As before, the Slovak Innovation and Energy Agency sent their employee as a chaperone with the group.

The final pilot program evaluation and proposals for its future development are to be discussed during Q1–2 2023.

9. Western Balkans Fund

Cooperation with the Western Balkans Fund (WBF) continued for the 6th year in a row utilizing the technical assistance grant (amounting to €40,000) for the period 2022–2023. Following the memorandum from Poznań/Rogalin from June 28, 2021, experience-sharing continued through training visits of WBF's staff to the Fund and so did joint evaluation of Western Balkan-related grant projects submitted within all three 2022 deadlines of Visegrad/Visegrad+ Grants.

V. PUBLIC RELATIONS AND OUTREACH

The year was framed by the preparation and finalization of the core communication strategy as the basic guidelines document for external and internal communication, further development of social media channels, and an increased number of in-person presentations/info sessions as well as monitoring visits to events organized with the fund's support.

The main goals and achievements of the year:

- Identifying and eventually outsourcing a PR/branding consultant
- Preparation of the Fund's Communication Strategy
- Adoption of a new set of guidelines and a finalized manual of the institution's visual identity
- 7 newsletters reaching 6,785 people
- 358,206 Facebook users and 24,964 Instagram users. We have got 1,796 new followers on both platforms
- Establishment of a LinkedIn fan page (active as of June 2022) with 1,171 followers

The "Project of the Year" contest (2021) selected "Wyszehrad non-fiction" by Kino Na Granicy/Kino na hranici (PL) in collaboration with Wind Mills (CZ), Absynt (SK) and the Terra Recognita Foundation for a Central European Dialogue (HU).

The annual anniversary reception was held at the Czech Centre in Bratislava on June 15, 2022.

A debate was organized under the title "Russian Aggression against Ukraine: Re-thinking the Support of Civil Societies in the Eastern Partnership" at the 2022 Globsec Bratislava Forum.

There were many public presentations and info sessions the staff conducted throughout the year. The highest turnout proved to always be outside of the capitals even in instances when the fund's staff pooled the presentations with other donors (e.g., at the Representation of the European Commission in Prague) or held hybrid events. Presentations and info sessions took place in the following cities (among others):

Belgrade, Bratislava, Brno, Budapest, České Budějovice, Cracow, Gdańsk, Hradec Králové/Pardubice, Karlovy Vary, Katowice, Kecsekemét, Michalovce, Miskolc, Nyíregyháza, Olomouc, Ostrava, Plzeň, Poprad, Poznań, Prague, Skopje, Sopron, Szeged, Tbilisi, Warsaw, Yerevan, Zlín

Furthermore, several on-line networking events were organized during the year to connect past and potential grantees and assist them with their project ideas (the so-called "networking sessions").

Thanks to our in-person meetings with people from smaller cities, we have also managed to attract smaller organizations and other public representatives. That is visible both in the raising number of followers on our social media and in the number of new applicants turning to us. I am especially proud of our Project of the Year competition, promoting exceptional projects since 2016. In 2022, the award went to the project Wyszegrad non-fiction festival Kino na hranici combining film with literature. We have also started with the process of creating a new visual identity and I am already looking forward to it!
